

Message from the Chairman

As we approach the end of another year, we find that a very dry summer has given way to an extremely wet autumn. The recent bad weather has taken its toll on some of the trees in the Parish. Most notably a large Cedar tree in the grounds of St Michaels in Bray. As much of the tree as possible has been removed by the parish council and a replacement Blue Cedar will soon be planted which will be funded jointly by the church and Bray Village Platinum Jubilee Volunteers.

This autumn saw the final appearance of Carters Steam Fair on Holyport Green. This annual event will be missed by our residents and brings an end to a tradition that has been a part of the Parish for many years.

On 22nd November this year the RBWM Council voted to adopt the East Berkshire Minerals and Waste plan that has been compiled by Hampshire County Council officers on behalf of the unitary authorities in our area. The adopted plan is available to view on the web and can be accessed using the title Minerals & Waste Plan via the RBWM website.

Currently the Parish council is undertaking improvement work to the allotments in Gays Lane. A second vehicle gate is being erected to give better access. This will facilitate the removal of accumulated waste from the area and will allow for the provision of a further two, or perhaps three allotment plots that can be made available to our residents.

The Remembrance Sunday services at our three outdoor memorials were well attended and Parish Councillors laid wreaths. Our thanks go to Simone Surveys who managed the relevant road closures free of charge. Wreaths were laid at the indoor memorial at Braywood on Remembrance Day at 11 am after the observation of the traditional two minutes silence.

The regular monthly inspection of Parish play areas has identified a few issues that are being rectified. A basket swing in Aysgarth Park has been replaced and uneven surfaces, caused by the summer dry weather, at the Jubilee Play Area will be dealt with.

The Borough Local Plan (BLP) seeks to considerably increase the number of dwellings in and adjacent to the Parish but is less than certain about how the infrastructure supports the increase in population. I would like to thank Cllr Suzanne Cross for accepting the leadership of the Parish Traffic and Highways Committee. Suzanne replaces Cllr Brian Millan who held this post prior to him resigning from the Parish Council this summer. I would like to thank Brian for his service to Bray Parish Council and wish him every success in the future. Initiatives started by Brian will, no doubt, be carried on by Suzanne.

Air quality has become a "hot topic" recently. Before the start of the Covid 19 pandemic your Parish Council started monitoring air quality at several junctions on our road network. The results for the last year now that traffic has got back to pre-pandemic levels has highlighted several areas of concern and the figures have been provided to RBWM to make the case for infrastructure improvement including reduced speed limits on a number of Parish roads. It is difficult to understand why a speed limit reduction on the A308 Windsor Road between Monkey Island Lane and Braywick is being resisted by RBWM when a similar road in Old Windsor A308 (Straight Road) is limited to 30 mph.

With the festive season soon to be upon us Bray Parish Council is once again providing Christmas trees at three locations in the parish – Braywood – Holyport Green – Fifield Open Space.



I wish all our residents a Happy Christmas and a Healthy New Year.

Soon after the start of the New Year will be into the run up to the local elections for Parish and Borough Councillors to be held in May. I would like to encourage everybody to consider participating in the democratic process.

Congratulations also to Alison Guilloud of plot 4 Gay's Lane who received the runner up prize for that site. All winners were presented with personalised, framed certificates, and the winners both received a £25 gift voucher for a local Garden Centre.

Bray Parish Council are delighted to announce that we have recently formed an affiliation with Goodgym, who have very generously offered their time to assist with various tasks and maintenance around the Parish.

GoodGym Windsor and Maidenhead are a friendly community, who combine volunteering with getting fit and being sociable. They help other charities and community projects with practical tasks, including everything from painting school fences, to planting trees in parks, sorting donations for refugees and distributing leaflets. They also help isolated older people by doing social visits and helping with jobs around the home like changing light bulbs or tidying gardens.

The 'getting fit' part of GoodGym is not only that tasks like digging or shifting things can provide a great workout, but also that members are encouraged to use the power of their legs to get to the task location, by walking, running, or cycling.

Members also benefit mentally, not only from the sense of achievement and satisfaction associated with volunteering, but also through connecting socially with a diverse and welcoming group, and through getting to know their local area.

To join GoodGym, there is no minimum time commitment, fitness level or payment required. Everyone is welcome. GoodGym have a meet up, walk or run and task every Wednesday evening, plus other ad hoc sessions at other times during the week and at weekends. Traffic & Highways

With the adoption of the Borough Local Plan in February, the RBWM has given approval for the building of a forecasted 3,150 residential dwellings in, or adjacent to, Bray Parish. These additional buildings will naturally result in increasing traffic volumes. More traffic equates to additional air pollution, a potential for heavier, larger vehicles, an increase in the volume of speeding vehicles and the knock-on impact to safety of residents and visitors to our road network.

As a Parish Council, the Traffic and Highways Committee already monitor traffic hot spots for air quality and given the concerning results, we are committed to continuing to do so. We will be extending this monitoring to 3 additional areas: the junction of Holyport Road / Stroud Farm Road by Londis, adjacent to Thames Valley Hospice and adjacent to the 'Bray Throat' (where the traffic goes into a single file in the centre of Bray Village.). The output from these air quality monitoring tubes is sent to specialists in Kent University who provide reports back to the council on the short- and long-term implications to both human health and the environment. We are also encouraged that RBWM will now be extending their single AQMA (Air Quality Management Area) in the Borough to additional sites so more air quality data points can be produced. Also, Bray Parish Council are delighted to continue to engage the expert help from Thomas Wrigley, to help further analyse the data and provide unbiased feedback.

Where can you help? If like me you want to help preserve the Green belt, mitigate urban sprawl and the additional traffic on our already congested highways, keep our residents safe on our roads from speeding vehicles and additional HGV's, especially where there is already a 7.5tonne limit, minimise additional air pollution and maintain our quiet enjoyment and peaceful living environment where possible, here are 4 things you could do:

Get involved! I am delighted to be working with several residents' associations and community groups who care passionately about the volume and speed of traffic across the highways in our Parish and the environmental impact this is having. Groups such as the Bray Traffic Action Group (BTAG), Oakley Green and Fifield Residents Association (OGAFRA) and Oakley Green and Fifield Community Association (OGFCA) provide a strong voice for all residents that are impacted across the villages and hamlets that they represent. In addition, we encourage your involvement



in forming Community Speed watch groups if you have areas on your roads where you perceive speeding to be an issue and where you want to help improve road safety. Thames Valley Police can provide local groups with equipment and training to monitor speeding in your area. We know that the RBWM want to make data driven decisions when it comes to traffic improvements, so the more data we as residents can collate for them, the better. **Slow down!** By slowing down, and driving more economically, you can not only potentially avoid accidents and keep the roads safer, but you can also save money and reduce your impact on the environment! This is underpinned by many studies, and, in these times of austerity, who does not want to save money and the planet! Simple measures such as reading the road and avoiding accelerating fast and then breaking hard, not only avoids wearing out tyres and brake pads it will also avoids adding additional particle pollution to our air – empirical data shows that this has relevance with electric vehicles too.

Walk, cycle, and use public transport where you can and are able to! We live in such a beautiful part of England and many of us relish our green open spaces, countryside, wildlife, hedgerows, architecture – all on our doorstep. Ensure your voice is heard! Talk to us, your Parish Councillors, and your RBWM Borough Councillors. Help us to continue to understand how our RBWM Borough Councillors intend to support us, understand their efforts to date, and how will they propose to improve matters in the future, given the proposed developments across the Parish which can only negatively impact our already congested roads. After all, all planning applications will be decided by RBWM.
